I think in terms of softball, we probably have enough ability on the pitcher and catcher to practice indoors a little bit, and that helps. And the pitch is very important in softball. So that might be one of the opportunities.

I think it is a national game. We will see the northern teams, the Big Ten, for example, and the northern part of the PAC 10, for example, participating and be competitive. And that's great because it gives more opportunity and more competitiveness.

JOSH CENTOR: One of the wild things, I think, is that a pitcher can throw hundreds of pitches throughout the course of the tournament. It's totally different than baseball.

DR. MYLES BRAND: It's a different movement. You know, I think when you throw a ball overhand, there's a certain limit you can do for your shoulder and elbow.

But I think that the motion, the underhand motion, allows the pitchers to continue. In fact, sometimes, the pitcher will pitch two games in a row, and I think you can do that just because the motion is so different.
